

APPENDIX 5. Special to the GRANITE ASSEMBLY

I have been a member of the Council unbiassed & perswaded, that I never promoted any scheme
but what cometh from your Excellency; that my Action fit attun'd with an honest open & clear Tho'g.

commanded to offer it again to you Gentlemen the present Delegates; Nor can I believe
a reasonable well meaning Man to the Government will ever be against it.
