At Richmond the lower part of the city was flooded by the James, which rose six feet in twenty minutes. At Lynchburg the water was twenty-live feet higher than ever before known. A large district in the lower part of the city of Richmond was submerged, and boats plied about the streets as on a canal. Of course great destruction of property was the inevitable consequence. Two hundred families in the lower part of the city were washed out and had to camp on the hills. The gas works were submerged and the city left in darkness, with the water in some places over the tops of the lamp posts. The James river was soven feet higher than ever before known.

The flood on the Rivanna is the highest experienced since 1807.

On the Manassas Railroad the bridges across the North and South Shenandoah rivers are gone. Scottsville, in Albemarl county, has been inundated, and the destruction of property was very great. Eighteen lives were lost.

Inmense damage has been done in the valley of the Shenandoah, forty-seven lives lost, and thirty dwellings washed away at Harper's Ferry.

Despatches from both French and Eng-lish sources report the defeat of a Prussian detachment in the forest of Eontainbleau, five miles northeast of Paris, on Tuesday, by French free-shooters. On the same day the Prussians bombarded the town of Epernon, thirty miles south-west of Paris, on the Orleans Railway and captured the position, the French garrison being driven back. 
