

A Canada journal contains a letter from a correspondent who professes to have been a stammerer from childhood almost to manhood, and who wishes to give other sufferers the benefit of the treatment by which he was cured. He says: Go into a room where you will be quiet and alone, get some book that will interest you, but not excite you, and read two hours a day, and get down to the same thing every two or three days, or once a week, if very tiresome, always taking care to read slowly and distinctly, moving the lips, but not the teeth. Then, when conversing with others, try to speak as slowly and distinctly as possible, and make up your mind that you will not stammer. I tried this remedy, and read for two years, and with my teeth together. The first result was to make my tongue and jaws ache—that is while I was reading; and the next to make me feel as if something had loosened talking apparatus, for I could speak with less difficulty immediately. The change was so great that every one who knew me remarked it. I repeated the remedy every five or six days for a month, and then at longer intervals, until cured.

A French writer thus describes Francis Joseph of Austria: "The Emperor betrays that kind of chronic melancholy which is made of gloom and delicate health; his gait is elegant and hesitating; he wears habitually the loose uniform of a cavalry officer. His foot is small, but he has a large hand; the thumbs are narrow and the nails round. His gesture indicates a certain embarrassment, not altogether devoid of dignity; his head is upright, his eyes well set, his hair is bright auburn; he is bald on the back of the head. His eyes are a grayish-blue and diamond shape; sometimes they sparkle with impatience, but soon settle again into that look of dull resignation which seems to be a characteristic of sovereigns who last long. He has a short, unturned nose joined to a strong firm and projecting mouth; the short lips covered by a heavy mustache, the small and receding chin, constitute the family mark and peculiarity of the House of Lorraine, and of the Imperial Prince of Habsburg and Bohemia.

Condensed beer, prepared according to a new process patented in England, appears likely to become of commercial importance. The liquid may be taken at any stage of fermentation, although preferably at the time when it is fit for drinking. It is evaporated in a vacuum, until a large part of the water and alcohol is distilled away, and the residue reduced to a thick, rich fluid, of about the consistency of molasses. The alcohol and water pass off in vapor, which is condensed, and the alcohol subsequently obtained by redistillation is mixed with the condensed beer, either before bottling or at any time afterward. In this way beer may be reduced to one-eighth or one-twelfth its original bulk, and it will keep for any length of time. To restore the beer to its first consistency it is only necessary to add the bulk of water distilled off, with a small quantity of yeast or other ferment, and in forty-eight hours the beer is ready for bottling. If charged with carbonic acid in a receiver, renewed fermentation is obviated.

Mr. von Chauvin, Secretary to the German Director-General of Telegraphs during the Franco-German war, appeared as a witness before a committee of the House of Commons on postal telegraphs. He gave a very animated account of the way in which that service was performed by the German army during his period of service. He stated that the telegraph was in constant use for the arrangement of the transport of ammunition, of the whole service of the Commissariat, the transport of wounded soldiers and prisoners, for the regulation of traffic in the field railways, which was very heavy, and which frequently necessitated the awing off of ammunition. He also mentioned the case of wounded soldiers going up ammunition. At Metz and Paris it was used to bring together troops whenever they were wanted either to repel a sortie or make an attack. The whole system was under a Colonel of Engineers.

Near the city of Moyobamba, Peru, has been discovered a tree called the tamic-capi or "rain-tree." It absorbs the moisture of the atmosphere, which it concentrates, and subsequently pours it forth from its leaves and branches in such quantities that in many cases the surrounding soil is converted into a bog, and it seems to possess this power to a greater degree during the dry, hot weather, when water is most scarce. The culture of these trees in arid wastes is recommended to the Peruvian Government.

At a Harrison county, Ky., wedding, we are informed, the bride danced several charming reels within a circle three feet in diameter. She changed shoes once on account of her new ones not sounding right against the floor. The prompter gave the very unique commands during the dance, "Rock to the right, rock to the left, grind coffee, wring the dish-rags, rock the cradle," &c. At the wind up of the dance the bride showed her agility by kicking the groom's hat off his head.

The London correspondent of the Liverpool Daily Post states that the homeoepathists have discovered a certain remedy for seasickness. It is amorphous, and a very small dose of it taken once an hour in water will remove the qualms. They are so certain of its success that they are going to procure a great quantity of it in various vessels that carry passengers. It is also useful for beasts, whose sufferings are often extreme.

The Emperor of Austria having been apprised of the existence of an Austrian military company in San Francisco, desired them, through his Consul in that city, to select a suitable uniform for its members, to be furnished at his expense. The company accordingly decided upon the uniform of the Imperial Jaegers of Vienna. The Emperor has been advised of their choice, and the complete outfit for 150 men is expected to arrive soon from Austria.

The East Indian Government lost in 1876-7 by exchange on transactions in London, chiefly through the negligence of the silver speculators, the sum of \$7,500,000. In order to escape this loss in the future, the Government has petitioned Parliament to be permitted to issue treasury bills to the amount of \$12,500,000, to be used only when the Indian Government is unable to sell its bills without a heavy sacrifice

The French officers of customs have lately discovered enormous frauds on the part of certain jewelry firms in Geneva, whose amazing prosperity has long been a puzzle to the trade. Their modus operandi was as follows: They would send a quantity of jewelry into France in the regular way and pay the duties. Then they would reexport it to Geneva and get the duties returned by the French Custom House. They soon after smuggled the same goods into France, and then taking them to a different Custom House from that to which they had gone with them before, would show their papers, proving the original entry of the goods, and get the duties again returned. It is estimated that they have thus victimized the French Government to the amount of \$800,000. The frauds are said to have been exposed by a clerk, who declined to receive \$12,000 to hold his tongue.

A San Francisco drummer in Nevada has devised a way to evade payment of the license required by law for soliciting orders in that State. He will not enter an order in his book, but presents the purchaser of his wares with a postal card addressed to the firm he represents, and instructs his customer to write his order thereon, and then pockets or mails it.

Paris will have kings enough and to spare at her Exposition next year. Already the sovereigns of Spain, Holland, Belgium, Portugal and Sweden have announced their intention of being present, as well as the Count d'Eu and Princess Imperial of Brazil and the Grand Duchess Constantine of Russia.

An official statement of the military forces of Spain has been published at Madrid, showing that the army would number in war time 243,000 infantry and 30,000 cavalry, with 200 guns. In times of peace the yearly contingents will be augmented to suit the exigencies of the budget.

The valley south of the Balkans, through which the Russian Gen. Gourko lately retreated before the forces of Sakimian, is the centre of the Oriental altar of roses district. Immense fields of rose bushes are grown there in long ridges, like potatoes.

Lampasa Springs, Texas, is the popular watering place of the Lone Star State, but the other day a party of horsemen dashed in among the sojourners, giving the Comanche warwhoop, and when they left three dead bodies were found in the street.

A Galveston man was divorced and married again; but the divorce proved invalid, and he committed suicide after his bride's trip, his estate of \$89,000 thereby going to his first wife.
