AN ACT to repeal and re-enact with amendments section two hundred and twenty-seven of Article ninety-three of the Code of Public General Laws of Maryland, sub-title "Orphans' Court." SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That section two hundred and twenty-seven of Article ninety-three of the Code of Public General Laws of Maryland, sub-title "Orphans' Court," be and the same is hereby repealed and re-enacted so as to read as follows: SECTION 2. The word enclosure in the preceding sections shall be construed to mean a common law enclosure and not an actual enclosure of the land.

SECTION 3. And be it enacted, That the Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

SECTION 4. We hereby certify that the foregoing is a correct copy of an Act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed January Session, 1892.
