GOV, BROWN'S MESSAGE. THE TIMES in its last issue gave the substance of Governor Brown's message to the legislature. The full text of the paper was given so far as it referred to the questions of revaluation and assessment, the oyster industry and public roads, perhaps the most important matters just now for legislative consideration. It is evident that the Governor is fully alive to the urgent importance of these questions, but conservatism is the keynote of his message.

Upon revaluation and assessment the Governor's position is, we believe, a matter of record and it may have been needless for him to make any further committal than his message contains. He favors a revaluation of all property and makes a practical suggestion for its accomplishment. As he says, there is no reason why a bill for a revaluation can not be passed in a very short time. This would leave the amendment of present laws, as to how taxes shall be laid, exemptions and so forth, for accomplishment by another bill. Thus the question upon which the Governor and the legislature joined issue two years ago, could be simplified and the executive and legislative branches might fight it out, revaluation at least being meanwhile assured.

Governor Brown is too thorough in his convictions, too careful in reaching a judgment, to recede hastily from ground he has once taken, and there is no reason now to believe his mind has changed in regard to what he considered the objectionable features of the Hayes

The necessity for going into the oyster question at length did not appear necessary, as a future special message is promised. On this and the road question, THE TIMES will in the future have something to say, as well as something further on reassessment as occasion shall arise. Notice is due the style in which the

message is issued. It is a handsomely executed pamphlet of ninety six pages and is copiously illustrated. The illustrations are photo-engravings of institutions supported wholly or in part by the State. These assist materially in making the pamphlet a most useful compendium of information in regard to State affairs, and worthy of a place among books of reference.

Governor Brown has given many evidences that he is thoroughly conversant with the duties of his office, even to the remotest detail, and these are strengthened by the message which, it must be conceded, is an excellent paper

THE TWO ASSESSMENT BILLS. Governor Brown has answered the question of what he would suggest in the way of assessment by the submission of a bill which has been introduced in the House of Delegates. This must tend to meet the criticism of those who may have claimed that in killing the Hayes biil two years ago the Executive had nothing to offer in its place.

The Governor has doubtless taken this method of recommendation as more practical than the embodying in detail of his views in his message to the legislature. As the bill must stand or fall on its merits, as the legislature is to determine whether it shall be accepted or rejected, as it is impossible for the Governor's action to be construed as an encroachment of executive upon legislative authority, as the executive is expected to make recommendations as to needed legislation, and as, indeed, such is the right of private citizens, there can be no real difference between the Governor's submitting his views for legislative consideration in the shape of a message, and submitting the same in the shape of a bill, save that the latter method is more expeditious in bringing fairly and squarely to an issue any points of difference between the two coordinate branches of government represented respectively by the Governor and the General Assembly.

LIABILITY OF FARMERS .- A case has been decided in the Circuit Court for tributing in the manner they have done Frederick county at the present term but will be of interest to farmers throughout the state, as indicating the degree of responsibility for accidents to farm hands. The case was that of William Shuff vs. Martin Brandenberg, of the western section of the county, and was an appeal from the decision of the magistrate in a suit brought by the plaintiff to recover damages for injuries re ceived in an accident while working for the defendant. Shuff was on a wagon half loaded with wheat shocks, and Brandenburg was driving the team. In rassing along the slope of a hill the wagon, with its contents, including Shuff, was pitched down the hill, and Shuff had one of his legs severely sprained, being under a surgeon's care for three months. He sued Brandenburg for \$75, and the ury gave him a verdict for \$50, after be ing out eight hours. The counsel for the defense made an effort to convict Shuff of contributory negligence, but the jury failed to look at it in that light.

IN TOUCH WITH THE WORLD.-Leonardtown, St. Mary's county, is to have a telephone line that will put it in communication with the outside world. Leonardtown has never had a railroad telegraph or telephone. The steamer sue has stopped at the town on her runs up and down the Potomac. Now, it is necessary to drive about sixteen miles to Mechanicstown to send a telegram, but work will soon begin on the erection o a telephone line between the two towns. It will cost about \$700 or \$1,000, all of which was subscribed at a recent meeting of the people of Lconardtown.


