EATING GERMS.

It is now known that the skin of various fruits contains germs.

With regard to the eating of fruit an important caution must be given: Fruit skins carry germs and are no more intended for human sustenance than potatoes, melon rinds or pea pods.

The bloom of the peach is a luxuriant growth of microbes, that of the grape only less so, and when these skins are taken into the stomach they find most favorable conditions for their lively and rapid development, which causes the skin to rot and decay.

This is the reason that many persons think they cannot eat raw fruit. If they would eat it with care, the skin of the fruit is not a danger to them.
