IN order to preserve the water of Jones's Falls as pure as possible for the use of the inhabitants of the city, it is judged necessary to publish once more an extract from the Law respecting it—and to caution the uninformed to be aware of violating it; as endeavors will be used to execute the law against offenders, without respect to persons.

By order of the Board,
JOHN BAYNARD, Sec'y.

"And be it enacted, That if any person shall wilfully pollute the said Water, between the pumping-house of the said Company and the mill on Jones's Falls, now owned and occupied by John Stricker and William Patterson, by throwing any dead animals, or other impure substances, into the same, or by swimming, bathing or washing themselves, or by washing cloaths or the skins of dead animals, or other impure things therein, or by erecting any necessary or other nuisance so near the said Water, as to pollute the same,—the person or persons so offending, shall forfeit and pay to the said Company, a sum not exceeding twenty dollars for every such offence—to be recovered by warrant, before any magistrate of the county or city of Baltimore—and shall be obliged to remove the said nuisance, or forfeit and pay the sum of ten dollars for every day the same shall continue, to the use of Baltimore county, to be recovered by action of debt, at the suit of the State."

Henck, William Edwards, William Wightman, Ivy Wright, Maximilian Huiler, & James Parish, appear before the county court: the court to use in the said county, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of the 6th day of October next, to answer such interrogatories as may be proposed to them by their creditors; and that they give notice of the passage of this order, (by causing a copy to be inserted in some one of the newspapers in the city of Baltimore every other day for three months successively, before the sixth day of October next.)
