Let none of the leaven of the eleventh Congress be found in the twelfth, lest it leaven the whole lump. If my father were a member of the present Congress, and his bread depended upon his re-election, I would not give him my vote.

Look around you, my fellow citizens! there are many among you every way qualified to be your Representatives; men who possess the "pen of the ready scribe and the tongue of the eloquent orator," although one of this description, to whom we all looked up in the hour of political peril, has extended to the throne of the Eternal, and left us in sorrow and in tears to bewail his early departure; yet still there are those who, though not so eloquent as a WILDS, have, notwithstanding heads to plan and hands to execute their country's welfare—when I name a CHURCH, a SMITH and CALHOUN, you will acknowledge the justness of the remark. TO THE SPECTATOR.

"Sir, Taxation has ever been considered one of the most difficult parts of government: In some countries taxes are raised wholly from the real, in others from the personal property. Some governments have adopted direct, others indirect taxation. Some governments tax faculties, and others give rewards for the same thing. In all there is more or less injustice—Now I believe I have hit on a method of taxing which will be submitted to with cheerfulness, and in operation will be perfectly just. My project is to tax the drinking of liquor. It will be voluntary payment, as those who are taxed in this way might have avoided it. It will be punctual payment, as people will drink & the government will not trust. It will be a just tax, as those who most incommode society will pay the most of it. It will fill the treasury, as the practice of drinking is now large and daily increases. Now every one will see, if our taxes can be paid in cheerfulness, and enough in amount, we should avoid much difficulty. All our squabble for licenses, and their nice calculations for two folds—the call of the constable, "that little tax I have against you Sir," would be at an end. I propose to raise the tax in the following manner:

- For every half gill of rum, brandy, gin, &c. or whisky, drank at one time, tax 1
- For every gill of do drank within 2 hours 3
- For every half pint do drank within 4 hours 7
- For every pint do drank within 12 hours 15
- For every quart do drank within 24 hours 32
- For getting what is called two thirds saved 50
- For getting drunk, each time 75

The surplus revenue raised from this source, to be laid out for the support of the poor, supporting schools, and opening public roads.
