The Purpose of the Maryland State Archives

October is American Archives Month, but what is the purpose of a state archives? State, county, and local government agencies generate an enormous amount of records. Most of this material has value only for a limited amount of time and can ultimately be destroyed. However a small portion of these records have such lasting value that they should never be lost. The Maryland State Archives is the repository for these permanent records. In addition to government records, the Maryland State Archives also collects non-government material that relates to the history of the State such as church records, newspapers, and the personal papers of prominent citizens.

Why does the State Archives preserve these records? Records document the lives of our people, the governments they create, and the rights they enjoy. They tell of our struggles, triumphs, and failures. They define who we are as a society. The Maryland State Archives is the place where these permanently valuable records are preserved and made accessible over time. The Maryland State Archives collects the records that make transparent government possible, preserves the evidence protecting individual and property rights, and protects Maryland's most essential records from natural and man-made disasters.

Maryland State Archivist Edward C. Papenfuse to Retire

During his time as state archivist, Dr. Papenfuse has taken the lead among state archives and other historical institutions in digitizing public records and making them available on-line. Dr. Papenfuse is also a noted historian who has spoken and published widely on Maryland history and politics.
